Dates in History

- **1887** On February 2nd, Groundhog Day was celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvaniya. It has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas which is when clergy would bless and distribute candles that were needed for the winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this tradition by selecting a hedgehog as a means of predicting the weather. German immigrants to America then continued the tradition, however, they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs.
- **1996** On February 10th, the world chess champion Garry Kasparov lost the first game of a six game match against Deep Blue, an IBM computer capable of evaluating over 200 million moves per second. Kasparov had previously defeated Deep Thought which was the prototype for Deep Blue. This was the first time in history that a computer and a human played an actual regulation six game match. Garry Kasparov ended up winning the match 4-2.
- 2004 On February 29th, *The Return of the King*, the last installment in the film adaptation of J.R.R. Tolkien's epic fantasy The Lord of the Rings, received 11 Academy Awards, tying the record held by *Ben-Hur* (1959) and *Titanic* (1997).
- 2010 On February 18th, the website WikiLeaks began posting classified U.S. government documents provided by army intelligence analyst Bradley Manning; it was believed to be the largest unauthorized release of state secrets in U.S. history.
