Dates in History

- 1775 On December 8th, Colonel Benedict Arnold and General Richard Montgomery lead an American force in the siege of Quebec. The Americans hoped to capture the Britishoccupied city and with it win support for the American cause in Canada.
- On December 1st, as no presidential 1824 candidate had received a majority of the total electoral votes in the election of 1824, Congress decided to turn over the presidential election to the House of Representatives, as dictated by the 12th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The House elected John Quincy Adams.
- On December 10th, the first Nobel Prizes 1901 were awarded in Stockholm, Sweden, in the fields of physics, chemistry, medicine, literature, and peace. The ceremony came on the fifth anniversary of the death of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of dynamite and other high explosives. In his will, Nobel directed that the bulk of his vast fortune be placed in a fund in which the interest would be "annually distributed in the form of prizes" to those who, during the preceding year, shall have conferred the greatest benefit on mankind."
- On December 6th, the Irish Free State, 1921 comprising four-fifths of Ireland, was declared, ending a five-year Irish struggle for independence from Britain. Like other autonomous nations of the former British Empire, Ireland was to remain part of the British Commonwealth, symbolically subject to the king. The Irish Free State later severed ties with Britain and was renamed Eire, and is now called the Republic of Ireland.
- On December 8th, the Chicago Bears 1940 trounced the Washington Redskins in the National Football League (NFL) Championship by a score of 73-0, the largest margin of defeat in NFL history.
