Safety Recommendation

Steam demands respect! A sudden burst of steam can be extremely dangerous! Steam hose couplings should not be a quick acting style but rather a threaded union type, such as our Boss series of couplings. When a threaded union is loosened under pressure, vapor will trace up the thread and serve as a warning to the operator that the line is "live". The operator then has time to safely re-tighten the threaded components, thus resealing the coupling.

Worn-out hose couplings can be dangerous. They should be checked regularly and replaced when necessary. Each coupling user should review applications and add safety devices where indicated.

Pressurized steam is an extremely dangerous commodity. Only hose, fittings, clamps and accessory items that have been approved for steam service should ever be used! Never use an unapproved item for steam service. Always follow the manufacturer's product recommendations for pressurized steam handling.
