### Dates in History

1627 The Siege of Grol started on July 20th. It was a battle between the Army of the Dutch Republic and the Spanish-controlled fortified city of Grol (now known as Groenlo, Netherlands), during the Eighty Years War and the Anglo–Spanish War in 1627. The siege ended on August 19th.

- **1737** An official exhibition of art sponsored by the French government is called a "Salon." The public was first admitted to the Salon de Paris art exhibition at the Louvre in Paris on August 18th. Exhibition at the Salon de Paris was essential for any artist to achieve success and marked a sign of royal favor.
- **1851** Although Isaac Merritt Singer did not invent the sewing machine, he designed the first practical and efficient one, and used mass-production techniques to manufacture it. Singer patented his sewing machine on August 12th.
- **1934** Appointed German Chancellor in 1933, Adolf Hitler quickly consolidated power. He merged the offices of chancellor and president and appointed himself "Führer" (leader) on August 3, 1934. He soon turned Germany into a totalitarian one-party dictatorship.
- 2003 At 4:10 PM on August 14th, a power outage began in the northeastern U.S. Some power was restored by 11 PM but many customers were without power for two days. It was the worst power outage in U.S. history, leaving 45 million people in the dark. In addition, 10 million people were left without power in Ontario, Canada.
