Dates in History

1613 When Ivan the Terrible died in 1584, Boris Godunov, his trusted advisor became the power behind the throne. Fearing Ivan's in-laws, the Romanovs, Boris sent the head of the family, Philaret, into a monastery and exiled all others well away from Moscow. The "Time of Troubles" ensued with false heirs and chaos until February 21, 1613 when a coalition of Russian lords elected Michael Romanov, son of Philaret, first Russian Tsar of the house of Romanov.

1790 Article Three of the U.S. Constitution took effect in 1789 establishing the U.S. Supreme Court. On February 1, 1790, the Supreme Court convened for the first time in the Royal Exchange Building on New York City's Broad Street. Chief Justice John Jay of New York presided.

1863 After failing to strike it rich prospecting for gold and silver, an enterprising young American wrote a humorous travel story for the February 3, 1863 issue of *Territorial Enterprise*, a newspaper serving Virginia City, Nevada. He was Samuel Longhorne Clemens and the penname he chose to use for the first time was Mark Twain.

1971 Rudolf Kingslake, eminent academician, lens designer, and engineer, studied optical design earning his Master's Degree at London's Imperial College of Science and Technology. He was invited to teach at the University of Rochester, where he founded the Institute of Optics. Kingslake later became the head of Optical Design department of Eastman Kodak while continuing his teaching at the university. Kingslake died February 8, 1971 at 99 years old.
