### Dates in History

1504 Michelangelo's statue of David was believed to have been installed on June 8th in the cathedral of Florence. Commissioned in 1501 and considered the prime statement of the Renaissance ideal of perfect humanity.

**1815** At Waterloo in Belgium, Napoleon Bonaparte suffered defeat at the hands of the Duke of Wellington on June 18th. Bringing an end to the Napoleonic era of European history.

1884 On June 16th, the first roller coaster in America opened at Coney Island, in Brooklyn, New York. Known as a switchback railway, it was the brainchild of LaMarcus Thompson, traveled approximately six miles per hour and cost a nickel to ride. The new entertainment was an instant success and by the turn of the century there were hundreds of roller coasters around the country.

**1933** Eager motorists parked their automobiles on June 6th on the grounds of Park-In Theaters, the first-ever drive-in movie theater. It was located on Crescent Boulevard in Camden, New Jersey.

- 1947 On June 8th, a hand-built aluminum prototype labeled No. 1 becomes the first vehicle to bear the name of one of the world's leading luxury car manufacturers: Porsche.
- **1967** The world's first cash dispenser was installed at Barclays Bank in Enfield, England on June 27th. The device was invented by John Sheppard-Barron. The machine operated on a voucher system and the maximum withdrawal was £10.
