## Ancient Chinese Technology

#### **Deep Drilling for Natural Gas**

The Chinese developed a drilling method by the first century BC which allowed them to drill boreholes up to 4800 feet deep. The deep drilling techniques used for today's supplies of oil and natural gas were developed from these Chinese techniques.

#### **Belt-Drive**

The belt-drive or driving-belt transmits power from one wheel to another, and produces continuous rotary motion. It existed as early as the first century BC in China. The chain-drive, a refinement of the driving-belt, was invented in China in 976 AD.

#### **Mechanical Clock**

The Chinese invented the first mechanical clock in 725 AD. It was built by the Chinese Tantric Buddhist monk and mathematician I-Hsing.

#### Rudder

The world's oldest representation of a rudder may be seen in a pottery model of a Chinese ship excavated from a tomb dated to the first century AD. Until Europeans adopted the rudder from the Chinese, Western ships had to make do with steering oars. This meant that long voyages of discovery by Europeans were impossible. The famous voyages of Christopher Columbus, Vasco da Gama, and others of their time were only made possible by the adoption of Chinese nautical technology.

#### Wheelbarrow

Wheelbarrows were in use as early as the first century BC in China.
