Maryland - Sixteen of the 23 Maryland counties border on tidal waters. The combined length of tidal shoreline, including islands, is 4,431 miles.

North Dakota - *The town of Rugby is the geographical center of North America. A rock obelisk about 15 feet tall, flanked by poles flying the United States and Canadian flags marks the location.*

Arizona - Four Corners (where Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado borders meet) is noted as the spot in the U.S. where a person can stand in all four states at the same time.

Rhode Island - *George M. Cohan was born in Providence in 1878. He wrote, "I'm a Yankee Doodle Dandy," "You're a Grand Old Flag," and a wide variety of other musical entertainment.*

Minnesota - Rollerblades were the first commercially successful in-line Roller Skates. Minnesota students Scott and Brennan Olson invented them in 1980, when they were looking for a way to practice Hockey during the off-season. Their design was an ice hockey boot with 3 inline wheels instead of a blade.

Arkansas - *Located just outside of Murfreesboro, Crater of Diamonds State Park allows dedicated prospectors to search for precious gems including diamonds, amethyst, garnet, jasper, agate, and quartz.*

## Ancient Chinese Technology

### Compass

During the Qin Dynasty, 221 - 206BC, the Chinese discovered naturally magnetic rocks called lodestones and used them to magnetize a piece of metal. These metal pointers would point in the general North/South direction, providing the world with the first compass.

### Gunpowder

By the 8th century the Chinese had a refined formula for gunpowder. They combined saltpeter and sulphur with charcoal to create gunpowder. The explosive grains were first discovered in earlier times by Taoist alchemists attempting to create an elixir for immortality - but by the 8th century the recipe had been formulated properly. This discovery allowed the Chinese to create fireworks and signal flares and later into weapons.

### Paper

While the Egyptians used Papyrus as a form of paper, the Chinese revolutionized the idea of a writing media. The paper was made by using bark from a mulberry tree, bamboo fibers and mixing them with water - then draining and drying the mixture on a flat bamboo frame. Other items used in papermaking included tree bark, hemp, linen and fishing nets.

One of Dixon's newest products for the DPL109 is the Safety Break-away Couplings. These couplings are designed to minimize spillage and damage associated with drive away and pull away incidents. Dixon offers three types of Break-away Couplings: Industrial Breaking Bolt, Marine Breaking Bolt and an Industrial Cable Release series.

The Industrial Breaking bolt couplings are designed so that the coupling automatically senses an excessive load, closes the valves and disconnects. These couplings are offered in stainless steel or aluminum and come with a Viton® seal.

Dixon's Marine breaking bolt couplings are designed to be installed within a string of hoses where the coupling will have a length of hose attached to both sides. The typical applications for these couplings are ship-to-offshore platform and ship-to-ship product transfer operations. These couplings are made from 316T1 stainless steel and have Viton® O-rings.

The Cable Release series automatically detect an excessive load, closes the valve and disconnects. The release is executed by pulling out the locking bolts with the help of a cable. The coupling is made from 316T1 stainless steel and has Viton® O-rings.
